North Carolina 4-H'ers Win Chicago Trips

SUPERIOR records of achievement in National 4-H Clothing, Girls' Record, Poultry and Tractor Maintenance programs have won 1948 state championship honors for four North Carolina club members. Each received an all-expense trip to the 27th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 28 to Dec. 2. The winners, who were selected by the state club office, and brief outlines of their records follow:

Willard Blackwelder, 17, of Statesville reaps double benefits from his participation in the 1948 National 4-H Tractor Maintenance program in which he learned how to better care for and operate a farm tractor, thus making him a more efficient young farmer. As a result he has been named State winner in the 4-H program. Willard says: "A tractor will help you if given proper attention such as greasing, changing oil at regular intervals and servicing the air cleaner and oil filter. Our tractor has meant better terraces for our farm and a more balanced farming program. He is now serving as leader of his local club. To recognize his many achievements, American Oil Company has provided Willard an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago.

In recognition of what she has learned in 4-H Club work about all phases of homemaking, Lota Harrison, 17, of Old Trap has been named State winner in the 1948 National 4-H Girls' Record program. During her six years in club work she has made 295 garments of clothing, grown a 41 acre garden, raised four baby beavers, frozen 85 packages of vegetables, 35 chickens and 1,000 lbs. of meat. Lota has served her club in many offices and is junior leader. Lota has been awarded an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, provided by Montgomery Ward.

Getting that well-known "new-look" was little trouble for Betty Moore, 17, of Statesville, who selected, sewed, made over or mended 198 garments for herself and other members of the family during six years of 4-H club work in addition to completing 29 4-H projects, of which six were in clothing. Betty served as president and secretary of her local club and secretary of the county organization; gave 80 4-H talks at club, community and school meetings and over the radio; and wrote 26 stories about 4-H tours, camps or special events. Named state winner in the 1948 National 4-H Clothing Achievement program, she was awarded an educational trip to the Chicago Club Congress provided by Spool Cotton Educational Bureau.

STATE COLLEGE HINTS TO FARM HOMEMAKER

By RUTH CURRENT State Home Demonstration Agent Misuse of kerosene, or coal oil, particularly in rural areas, causes hundreds of deaths each year. One common and dangerous practice is the use of kerosene to speed up a slow fire. Kerosene vaporizes when poured into a warm stove, and this vapor may explode, igniting clothing and furniture in the room. Kerosene should never be used to start fires. Kerosene as well as other fuels is often used in portable open-flame heaters. They must be cleaned frequently, handled with care, and repaired promptly when defects become apparent. They should never be filled indoors or placed where there is danger of knocking them over. They should never be used in tightly-closed rooms and under no circumstances should they be left burning in bedrooms after you have retired.

Breads offer a chance for variety in your meals. The modern homemaker who is keeping up with the newer knowledge of nutrition is making sure that all bread and rolls she serves are enriched or whole wheat. In making biscuits, loaf bread, pancakes, waffles, cookies, gingerbread, and cakes, she uses whole wheat or enriched white flour. Oatmeal is an excellent food that adds to the variety and food value of cookies.

Use prunes in cookies, cereals and puddings. They are a good source of iron, vitamin A, and niacin. Molasses—the blacker, the better. Use in cookies, cakes, puddings, bread, and on pancakes. It is high in calcium, iron, and niacin.
