Coach Jake Atkinson hopes to be able to field a formidable team by the time the mighty Mountaineers from the hills of Boone invade the peaceful valley of Cullowhee.

Only three lettermen from last year's squad that placed three men in second place in the Carolina's AAU's are returning for action this year, Don Thames, 155 pounder, Jack McCracken, 165, and Bozo Burtleson, 175, are the three returning lettermen. Thames and McCracken have been elected to co-captain the Catamount squad through this season.

Other members of the squad include: 121: Raul Marco and Squirt Williamson; 128: Dan Heath and Robert Flemming; 136: George Quesada; 145: Jack Arney; 165: Fred King; 175: Joe Coffey; and heavyweights: William Luquire, 195, and Dan Donovan, 225.
