is located at the pressure reducing of the Eastern Star. station, the equipment consisting of a manually controlled direct feed chlorinator.

Considerable problems have arisen in the past regarding this supply. The more important are listed below:

1. Since no treatment other than sterilization is provided, the reservoir and distribution system receive considerable silt.

2. Entrained air in the system caused by air being sucked into the main at the intakes.

3. Difficulty in keeping a full reservoir: Apparently the town is using water at twice the normal consumption rate due to leakage and wastage on unmetered services

4. Inadequate chlorination. Since the equipment provided feeds at a constant rate unless the machine setting is changed manually, there are times when the water does not receive enough chlorine to properly sterilize it. On occasion, through lack of supervision, the machine has been allowed to run out of chlorine gas and not even sterilization has been provided.

The water quality of the supply is good except for occasional turbidity increase due to rain and consequent increase in run-off. From (Continued from page 8)




