

Bond Program

An act authorizing the issuance of two hundred million dollars of bonds of the State to provide for the construction of secondary roads, subject to a vote of the people of the State, was enacted by the 1949 General Assembly. The act was passed upon the insistance of Governor W. Kerr Scott, who is now making a state-wide appeal for passage of the bond election in favor of the bonds. The General Assembly also authorized the Governor's program for issuance of \$25,000,-000 for building new and repairing school buildings of the State, subject to a vote of the people.

A state-wide special Road and School Bond election has been called for June 4th and each county has set-up election machinery for holding the election, which will be under the same rules and regulations as any general election. All qualified voters of the state are eligible to vote

Under the provisions of the proposed bonds Jackson county has been allocated the sum of \$1,534,-000 of the \$200,000,000 road money, and allocation from the school building bonds \$372,344.00. This is proposed money this count should get if both Road and School bonds are approved by the voters

The ballots for the special election carries both the road bond question and school bond question. A voter may vote for one type of bond ant against the other, or vote for or against both issues.
