

A child must become six years of age on or before the first day of October of the current school year and must enroll during the first month of the school year. This is a State Law; therefore,

Thomas Urges Steps Be Taken To Clean Hog Pens, Filter Swimming Pool Water, Etc.

At the regular meeting last Friday night, Mayor Hugh Monteith and the board of aldermen heard several recommendations concerning sanitation in the Town of Sylva from District Health Officer Charles Thomas.

Stating that the present board, and other recent boards, had innerited a situation for which it was not responsible, Thomas said that he hoped the board would keep his suggestions in mind and act upon them when feasible.
