There is a possibly of the farmer receiving more than 85 cents per pound for his crop as the quality controls the price. It can go as high as \$1.20 per pound but the tobacco companies are guaranteeing 85 cents in order to promote the production.

The Jackson farmers began priming their crops Monday, taking the ripe leaves off and preparing them for curing, which is done by air and sun.
