
Rev. D. H. Dennis was returned to Cherosice and Rev. O. E. Thorne to Whittier charge.

Jackson County War Hero Memorial



The above picture will give our readers some idea of the attractiveness of the new War Memorial Fountain recently completed at the West end of Main street and foot of the court house steps. Those who have visited the fountain since its completion and since the water has been turned on, know that this is one of the most striking memorials in this section.

The fountain project was started several months ago by the members of the Legion Auxiliary of Jackson County. These ladies have worked hard to bring a suitable memorial to honor the memory of the men and women of the county who served so faithfully and unselfishly in recent World Wars.

The total cost of the completed fountain was \$2,423.27. Of this amount \$1,788.32 has been paid through contributions of local citizens and buisness firms. This leaves an unpaid balance of \$635.00 which the Auxiliary members will attempt to raise within the near future. Until this debt is paid the fountain cannot be dedicated and the colored lights turned on. Many have been wondering why the lights have not been turned on and this is the reason.
