

COUNTY LIBRARY LENT 13,000 BOOKS LAST YEAR

More than 13,000 books were checked out of the Jackson county public library during the past year Mrs. Mae Stallcup, librarian, reported. Considering the fact that there are only 4100 books upon the library's shelves, the figures show an extensive use of the library's facilities.

Adult Fiction was the type literature most read during the year, 5,942 of that category being borrowed from the library. Children's fiction was not far behind with a total of 4,954.
