year; July 4, Labor Day, Sept. 4, Thanksgiving, November 30, and Christmas.





Cashiers, Addie **Buildings To Start** Soon, Others Follow

Jackson County is about to launch on a county-wide school building and improvement program according to an announcement by the Board of Education this week. The Board has submitted to The Herald the complete proposed building program for the county as recently authorized and approved by the State Board of Education. While the final proposed plan is not what the local Board originally had in mind, it is the only plan the State will authorize at this time. The local Board would like to carry out a much broader improvement and new building program, but available funds will only permit the final authorized plan.

The Board has available \$668,-339.93, and the proposed plan calls for expenditure of \$668.000.00. This amount comes from the following sources: State of North Carolina, \$371,339.93; county bond sales, \$285,000.00, and probable property sales, \$12,000.00. This fund is in addition to the amount already spent for the new building at Barker's Creek and the


