Farm Agent Advises Growers To Spray Tobacco Beds Early

The tobacco crop that Jackson County growers will place on the market this fall will be no better than the plants they set in the field this spring. The unseasonable cool temperatures and frosts have already done considerable damage to our plant beds. Plant bed diseases also do most damage to plants during cool, damp weather. The diseases can be prevented at little cost.

Burley and Turkish tobacco plants are subject to two serious diseases, wildfire and blue mold. The wildfire disease gets its name from the speed with which it spreads through the plant bed. The early stages of the disease appear as small yellow spots on the leaves. Later these spots turn brown and are surrounded by a larger yellow circle. The disease starts in the plant bed and usually spreads in the field after transplanting. Wildfire can be pre-
