In the year that Jackson County has participated in the Red Cross Blood program 312 pints of blood and Belgium. have been received from the Red Cross Blood Bank and used by people in Jackson County. During this same period Jackson County people have only given 195 pints of blood, which means that Jackson county citizens have used 117 pints of blood given by people in other counties, and this at absolutely no cost to any one for the blood.




