What the Office-Seeker Professed.

Here is what the Chicago platform— which Mr. Cleveland accepted and on which he was elected to his present place of power—says on the subject of Federal officials interfering in politics:

"The nomination of a president, as in the recent republican convention, by delegations composed largely of his appointees, holding office at his pleasure, is a scandalous satire upon free popular institutions and a startling illustration of the methods by which a president may gratify his ambition. We denounce a policy under which the federal officeholders usurp control of party conventions in the States, and we pledge the democratic party to reform these and all other abuses which threaten individual liberty and local self-government."

"The 'sound money' Democrats are centering their efforts upon Indiana and Illinois, chiefly upon the latter, with the hope of capturing he delegations to the Chicago convention. Current reports are that the silver men have the upper hand in both those States, and silver men are said to be growing reckless in their confidence. Mr. Springer, who has been here several days, and Senator Palmer, the two principal 'sound money' Democrats of Illinois now in Washington, speak as if they thought it was a hopeless case for their friends in Illinois. Mr. Springer says that it does not look as if the 'sound money' men were doing anything toward carrying the delegation.

"This is only surface talk.
"The fact is that, as quietly as possible, the administration people are putting forth a tremendous effort to capture the Illinois delegation.
"It is not intended to leave it to the locals only, but to get all possible aid from the 'sound money' Democrats of the east, chiefly in New York and Massachusetts, and to use the influence of the national administration. Ex-Representative Ben. Cable and Mr. Springer through his lieutenants at home are conducting a quiet and earnest campaign. Their efforts are at present directed chiefly to the capture of the Cook county delegates, who control about 40 per cent. of the State convention.

"Mr. Cable is quoted as reporting that the prospects are very good for success in Cook county, though a few days ago he expressed a different opinion. It is said that the renewed hopefulness is due, not to Mr. Carlisle's visit to Chicago, but to the expectation that ex-Mayor Hopkins will repudiate Altgeld and to his determination to throw big influence in favor of the anti silver people.

"The claim that Hopkins will throw the Cook county delegates against Altgeld comes from administration sources. It is understood that Bynum of Indiana and Cable of Illinois, when they came to Washington a few days ago, made very discouraging reports to the President from their respective States, and steps were taken to strengthen the lines. It is understood that the President has sought to impress upon the 'sound money' Democrats of the east that if they hope to capture the Chicago convention they must give substantial assistance to their friends in Indiana and Illinois."

Mr. Henderson's Queer Letter.

The Herald surrenders all of its editorial space to-day to a letter from Hon. John S. Henderson. His views upon the financial question are not in accord with ours, nor are they what a majority of his friends in the State believed, but they are honest and the money question is one upon which the Democracy is divided. Representative Henderson is out in a letter. He is claimed to be "a sound

money" man, whatever that may mean in the nomenclature of latter-day converts to gold. But we find this in his letter, and it is nearly all we have read of it, and construed by the laws of language it does not authorize us or any one to say he has deserted the party platform and surrendered bag and baggage—"horse, foot and dragoons"—to the "sound money" gold only demands of the North. Mr. Henderson says this:

"Personally I am not for gold monometallism, and I am not for silver monometallism. I am, as I have always been, for bi-metallism. Ten years ago I said that the people were determined to retain silver as a currency and to protect the dollar of their fathers as a good, honest dollar and to keep it on a par with gold."

"I have never entertained other views, although I have voted for free coinage when I believed the standard dollar could be maintained and circulated at its coinage value on a parity with the gold dollar."

Mr. Henderson is a man of excellent character, of good parts, a lawyer of reputation. Personally we have not a word to say to his detriment. If he has really flopped it will mortify many friends and lessen the confidence of the masses in their leaders, and public servants. The Charlotte Observer heads the Representative's long article—"J. S. Henderson for Sound Money—Makes a Bold Stand for Principle." All that do not agree with what he has written, whatever it is, may be considered as not "standing for principle." Save the mark!

That may look as if he has come to the parting of the ways and that he and his old party friends are no longer agreed. If that should be the fact, and we do not say it is, then who has left the party? It is certainly very perplexing to ordinary mortals to understand the talk now. * * *

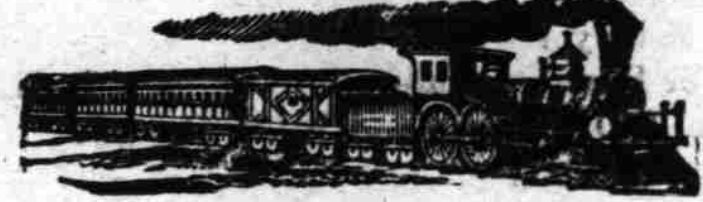
