Governor Carr has made requisition on the Governor of Georgia for Angus Archie Brayboy, the Croatan, charged with the murder of a woman in Robeson county. —The Secretary of the Populist State committee says Democrats and Populists in the eastern counties are fusing on the silver question. —Sub-Alliances of the Farmers' Alliance are endorsing the refusal of the Populist committee to fuse with the Republicans. —There was a big Republican meeting in Raleigh Wednesday night; Judge Russell was one of the speakers; in trying to explain away his "negro savages" letter, he said the statement did not apply to intelligent negroes. —The Pennsylvania Democrats hold their State convention; they adopt a gold standard revenue tariff platform and present Robert E.
