Death of Major Campbell.

The community of Fayetteville in which he has spent the 85th year of his eminently useful life was greatly grieved to learn of the death of the venerable Major A. M. Campbell which occurred at his residence on Rowan street at 7:30 o'clock this morn-

Major Campbell was born March 15th, 1811, in Campbellton. In 1837 he married Miss Elizabeth Moore, daughter of Frederrick Moore, Esq. To this union were born eleven children, eight of whom are living, four sons and four daughters.

In 1844 he became commander of the F I. L. I. company, and was honored and respected by that gallant body as few of its commanders had been before or since.

Major Campbell held many positions of trust before and since the war. He has served this county as register of deeds for fifteen years, been school examiner and school fund treasurer; and was for many years clerk to the board of aldermen. During the war, being too old for active service, he was put in charge of the commissary whose duty it was to issue rations to the soldier's wives and children.

He was a life long Mason and achieved many honors in this ancient and honorable order. A picture of him, a speaking likeness, adorns the walls of Phœnix Lodge, No. 8.

The funeral will take place from St. John's church tomorrow afternoon at 5 o'clock.




