Hon. R. M. Furman,

DEAR SIR:—I received your inquiry concerning the recent primary and my views as to primaries in the future. I hesitated some time, doubting whether I should express an opinion about a matter upon which I may soon vote, but after considering the question carefully, I am satisfied it is no longer an open question. The State Democratic platform says in plain language: "We favor the enactment of laws by the next General Assembly providing for the holding of primary elections for the nomination of State and county officers, Representatives and United States Senators."

I accepted nomination for office knowing this to be in the platform. In the canvass I defended my party and spoke in favor of its platform and declarations. I cannot run for office on a platform and then vote against it after I am elected.

For me there is no option. I feel that I am in honor bound to vote to carry out the promise of my party. If the legalized primary (which by the way we have not yet tried) turns out to be unsatisfactory, the next State convention can and will recommend its repeal. Our laws are not like those of the Medes and Persians.

At any rate I am old fashioned enough to believe a party platform means something more than a mere vote trap. It is the solemn promise of a party to the voters of the State. Its promises must be kept. Its remedies must be given a trial.
