We challenge the Enterprise, the official organ of the Court-House Ring and the claim speculators of the county, to point out a single instance in which we have made a mis-statement of facts, or have mis-quoted the records of the county.

A full four months school in every school district in Madison county to be taught by a competent teacher, for next year, is one of the benefits brought about by the tax paying feature of the new Constitution.

The leaders of the "Ring" seem very much agitated because the poll-taxes can't be paid on election day and the man be allowed to

vote. Of course these leaders want to have the right to come up on election day and use a lot of their ill gotten gains out of the public funds and pay off the taxes for a lot of poor men and have such men to vote for them and thereby perpetuate themselves in power by the use of such money. If such were the case no poor man would ever stand any chance for election no matter how deserving he might be.

The Enterprise, Pritchard's mouthpiece, with its nominal ring doodle editors at the head of its column, through the efforts of its editor-in-chief, little Windy Tommy, is trying very hard to create a false impression against the tax paying feature of the new constitution. Of course the leaders of the "Ring" and the claim speculators of the county are opposed to it for they can see very plainly that there will be no more big money to be made out of the insolvent list and the claim speculating business will soon be at an end.
