## THE RECORD THE STATE DEMOCRATIC

MAJORITY PROBABLY 60,000 SOLID DEMOCRATIC CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION APPARENTLY ELECTED.

RETURNS FROM THE COUNTY. The State has gone democratic by a large majority though the total vote is comparatively light. As we go to press the returns from all the counties of the State are in hand, but there is sufficient data at hand to indicate the democratic majority to be about 60,000. Eight democratic congressmen are certainly elected with indications favorable to the election of Gudger in the tenth and Klutz in the eighth, as far as returns have been had.

The election throughout the county was peaceable and orderly. Each side contended with genuine zeal and earnestness and the result shows about an average gain of 600 for the democrats. The following are the returns from the county:

Ordered by the board that R. S. Ramsey be allowed \$17.10 serving notices on registrars and judges of election. Ordered by the board that R. S. Ramsey be allowed 3.25 for money paid out for county as per bill. Ordered by the board that R. S. Ramsey be allowed 18.00 bedding for county prisoner as per bill. Ordered by the board that R. S. Ramsey be allowed 30.00 holding court. Ordered by the board that Jas. Haynie be allowed 7.50 as officer over grand jury. Ordered by the board that J. K. Hardwick be allowed 20.00 services as superintendent of health. Ordered by the board that Mr. M. A. Chandley be allowed 20.00 for feeding jurors. Ordered by the board that R. S. Ramsey be allowed 23.00 for summoning jurors. Ordered by the board that S. L. Rector be allowed 200.00 for work on Hot Springs bridge and fill on same. Ordered by the board that W. M. English be allowed 14.00 services as commissioner. Ordered by the board that Wm. S. Rice be allowed 14.20 services as commissioner. Ordered by the board that Ira Plimmans be allowed 16.40 services as commissioner. Ordered by the board that Len Henderson be allowed 230.86 keeping paupers for month of October and September. Ordered by the board this board stands adjourned until the 24th day of November 1902.
