Marshall Schools.

Last week our Schools closed with an ecstacy that was never equalled in our town. From beginning to end the exercises were good. The contestants were every one good and it was only after the Judges brought in their decision that the question was decided. Miss Francis Morrow was awarded the medal that had been presented by Hon. On Friday Dr. C. B. Waller gave one of the best addresses ever heard in Marshall. It was on "The men we need" and to a large audience, the time passed in a moment so interesting was the speaker. At night the school gave a play called "The Old District School" and for over an hour the people were convulsed by the antics of pupils and the bright retorts of all. The year has been a good one and now that it is over we regret to see the building closed. We owe it to all the faculty to say that they have been conscientious in the discharge of their duties and have given us a good year.

We keep the faculty with the exception of the principal who resigned in order to accept another position. Prof. Anders has been very conscientious in teaching, and as lay in his power has done good work. We wish him abundant success in the new position which he will occupy. During the two years of his incumbency the cause of the school has been bettered and the High School has been placed on a parity with the others of the state. And he has held this position longer than any one since the public school commenced here. We have only praise for him and regret that he is not to stay.

The other members of the faculty will stay with us and the good work of past years is a guarantee that better work will be done in the future. It is with a feeling of sadness that we enter the long vacation months and we do hope that school may come again soon. With a really new building, at least an enlarged building and an enlarged faculty in the future, we predict for Marshall High a and Graded schools an era of success in training our young people for life and work.
