School Law Amended.

Below is a copy of an act of the legislature amending the compulsory school law as affecting the counties of Madison and Avery compelling the attendance of children between the ages of eight and fourteen years and applying to children not regularly employed between the ages of fourteen and seventeen years. This is a good law and ought to be enforced to the letter. That big gawky boy that lays around and does nothing and who hasn't got ambition enough to learn to write a decent letter will have to go to school or go to work. Too, that pretty little woman weighted down with bangs and frills and powders and paint will have to give up her idle dreams and get busy, either in the school room or some where else. The bill goes into effect July first, 1914. The only mistake is that it was not effective when ratified.

A bill to be entitled an Act to Amend Chapter 173 of Public Laws, session nineteen hundred thirteen, entitled "An Act to Make School Attendance Compulsory." The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That section one of Chapter 173 of public Laws, session of nineteen hundred thirteen be and the same is hereby amended by adding at the end of said section the following: "And provided further that the period of compulsory attendance shall be in force and apply between the ages of eight and fourteen in Madison and Avery counties; and all children in said counties between the ages of fourteen and seventeen, who have not completed the course of study being taught in their respective free school districts and are not regularly employed, shall be subject to all the provisions of this act."

Section 2. That this act shall apply to Madison and Avery counties only.

Section 3. That this act shall take effect and be in force from and after the first day of July, 1914.

The above is a copy of amend-

ment to compulsory school law, which I have passed for Madison County no doubt your readers would be interested in it. It is now the law. JAMES E. RECTOR.
