Recorders Court

State vs. Mitchell Gosnell, retailing, continued, jury trial ordered.

In the cases of State vs. Lum Gosnell a very novel thing happened. Sometime ago in the trial of an action in the Recorder's Court it was developed that this defendant had been "bootlegging" and the news was carried to the defendant Lum. Upon hearing that the court was in possession of facts proving his guilt the defendant sold his work steer for \$52.00 and raked up, altogether, \$75.00. No papers had been issued for him. Wednesday morning when court opened, Lum appeared on the spot. The Solicitor issued two warrants for him and he was called upon to plead in the two cases. He pleaded guilty. The Court was informed of the facts in the case by the Solicitor whereupon the court inquired of the defendant how much money he had. The defendant stated that he had \$75.00. Upon further inquiry it was brought out that the defendant had a brother and two sons on the chain gang for bootlegging. The Court took the view that the defendant intended to reform himself and go out of bootlegging business, otherwise he would not have come into court until brought in by an officer. He was permitted to pay over to the Clerk the \$75, all of which went into a fine in the first case except so much as was necessary to pay off the costs in the two cases. In the second case prayer for judgment was continued to October 28. The Solicitor suggested that Lum was somewhat like the chickens belonging to a gentleman who moved so often that the chickens would come up and cross their legs to be tied when the fellow got ready to move. Any way Lum came in and had his legs tied, which is a little out of the ordinary. Lum said the Court need not have any fear of his selling any more liquor.

County Commencement.

Dear Editor:—I wish to use a short space in your valuable paper to introduce to your many readers the purpose of and the plans for the County Commencement which is to be held in Marshall on Friday, April 24.

Our Commencement Day is set apart in honor of the pupils who completed the seventh grade work in our schools this year. This is to be a day of rejoicing with these pupils and a day of rejoicing over the progress made in the school work during the year. It is to be more than that. On this day we hope to gather together all the people of the County who are interested in the educational work of the County for the purpose of planning a larger work in the educational field. There is a larger work to be done in Madison County educationally, and there are ways of doing this work more efficiently. We cannot work out these plans without co-operation. We cannot co-operate without planning together.

This is the first attempt to have a County Commencement in Madison County. Other Counties throughout the state are making this event a glorious success. I have confidence enough in the people of our county to believe that they can do what other people are doing if they will try. The Board of Education has decided to make the County Commencement a permanent feature of the school work. The Board cannot do this without the hearty support of the people.

I take this opportunity to solicit the hearty co-operation of all in this work. We have set apart Friday, April 24th, for our Commencement Day this year. I hope that every school will be represented in the Grand Parade which will take place at ten o'clock. We invite every child, every teacher, every school committeeman, every parent, and every one interested in the great cause of education to be present on April 24th and enter the Grand Parade. We want every committeeman in the County to bring this to the attention of the people of his community and insist upon their being in Marshall with the school children on that day.

The program in full will be published in next week's issue of the News-Record. Let every reader of this paper talk the County Commencement for the next two weeks.
