## Will England be Invaded?

(Springfield Republican.)

Is an invasion of England still contemplated? Some observers in Holland believe so on the strength of preparations made in Belgium and on the German coast. More stringent regulations have also been made prohibiting foreigners, even though neutrals, from approaching the sea. It is possible that the menace of invasion is counted upon to keep a great British army in England, but even if this is the dominant strategic motive, of course everything would be kept ready to seize the opportunity if it should come. Much depends on the balance of naval strength, and it may be that the Germans hope to whittle down the British margin to a point where no surplus would be left to prevent an invasion if a daring feat should be made in another place by the German battle fleet. It is suggested that not the least of the motives for the ruthless war upon fishing boats is the desire to clear the North sea of observers who might report the movements of German warships. Such a dash is not inconceivable, but the chances are so greatly against its success that it would probably be attempted only as a last resort. England seems to be less concerned over it than over the danger that new forces released on the eastern front may be thrown into Flanders for a new drive at Calais, but a strong army for home defense is thought necessary.

## THE CONFEDERATE WAY

(Ocala, Fla., Star.)

The sinking of the Lusitania recalls an almost forgotten chapter in history. In December, 1862, the Ariel, a large passenger steamer, owned by Vanderbilt's grandfather, Commodore Vanderbilt, was overhauled by the Confederate cruiser Alabama off the coast of Cuba. The Ariel had on board 140 Federal officers and men, a battalion of marines on their way to the Pacific station. She also had on board over 300 other passengers, many of them women and children. Of course, it was not possible for the Alabama to take the passengers of the Ariel, which was a large and valuable ship, and the property of an enemy of the South, but it never occurred to Confederate commander, Raphael Semmes, to sink the vessel. He sent one of his officers to reassure the women and children who were expecting dreadful things from the "pirate." Not an article belonging to any passenger was touched. The soldiers were paroled, the ship placed under bond (a bond that Commodore Vanderbilt never made good) and the Alabama steamed away to seek for stronger foes. The South was shut in with powerful foes, as Germany is shut in, and the South was crushed in defeat as Germany probably will be, but, defeated or victorious, Germany can never have the shining record for chivalry and consideration for the weak, coupled with unsurpassed courage, that is the imperishable heritage of the Southern Confederacy.
