Enforcing Vital Statistics Law

(Bulletin North Carolina State Board of Health.) Mr. J. A. McIntyre, state prosecuting agent for the vital statistics law of North Carolina leaves Duplin county for the western part of the state. His working in the western counties at this time is due to the inconvenience of travel and the intense cold weather later on in the winter. He goes first to Burke county. Other counties suspected of incomplete registration that will all so be visited by the agent are: Buncombe, Jackson, Swain, Graham, Cherokee, Macon, Yancey, Mitchell and Watauga. Before leaving for the western part of the state, Mr. McIntyre, visited Duplin and Lenoir counties and brought suit against Dr. Bud Hyatt of Lenoir for failure to report births. Prosecution proceedings for the same offense were brought against Dr. John Bynum of Winston-Salem by Mr. E. S. Armfield, local prosecuting agent, and for failure to report deaths against Mr. R. L. Loftin undertaker of High Point. There's nothing else we can do to get complete registration but to enforce the law, said Dr. J. R. Gordon, chief of the bureau of vital statistics. "We must have accurate and complete registration of births and deaths," Dr. Gordon stated that there are now local prosecuting agents in Duplin, Sampson, Johnson, Pender, Bladen, Roberson, Columbus, Surry, Yadkin, Davie and Union. It appears that the vital statistics law is no longer to be lightly considered.

Picture Approved; is Ready to be Shown

Captain Robert H. Reynolds returned to Asheville yesterday from a visit of two weeks to New York, where he saw "Captain Bob of the National Guard" passed by a board of censors from the war department and later witnessed the production at which the national board of censors approved the picture in its representatives by reason of the fact that United States troops and officers were used in the production of the reels and permission to use them was secured upon condition that the picture would not be placed on exhibition before being shown to officers selected by the war department. Captain Reynolds stated yesterday that the picture met with the approval of the department and the board of censors, which devotes its entire time to the inspection of reels to be offered to the people of the United States. Now that it has the approval of the two bodies to which it was exhibited. It will be given general circulation. Beginning next Monday week, engagements will be started at Richmond, Atlantic City, Columbus, O., Seattle and Kansas City. While a number of the army scenes were secured at government posts, the greater part of the picture was taken at Asheville and scenes of this city are featured in the production of the pictorial story. The plot is based on the importance of the national guard organizations of the country and the picture is presented with a view to increasing interest in and support of the organizations which are affiliated with the national guard.
