#### The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

SECTION 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell or offer for sale any quail, patridge, squirrel, rabbit, or pheasant in the County of slip, enclose with five cents to Foley Madison.

SECTION. 3. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to ship, send, or carry any quail, patridge, squirrel, rabbit, or pheasant out of the County of Madison.

SECTION 4. That any person, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not exceeding fifty dollars or imprisoned not more than thirty days.

SECTION 5. That This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

#### An Order By Board of Health,

Marshalli, N. C., Oct. 11, 1915. The Board of Health of Madison County met in response to call of Chairman with the following members present: N. B. McDevitt, J. N. Moore, J. C. Tilson, R. N. Caton and G. C. Brown.

It was ordered by the Board of Health that the law heretofore passed prohibiting the keeping of hogs and hog pens in the town of Marshall and all other incorporated towns of the county be enforced by the officers of the county and it is urgently requested that the officers of the county shall prosecute any and all persons violating this law and that the officers give notice that any and all persons keeping or having hogs after the first day of December 1915, in violation of the law, that a warrant shall be issued for all such persons and that they shall be prosecuted without delay. This order applies also to all laws passed formerly by the Board of Health of Madison County. This order shall not have the effect to repeal any law heretofore passed by the Board of Health and shall not exempt any one from prosecution for a violation of any of the "health laws" for Madison County or any incorporated town thereof.
