Additions To The Town Water System, Gravity Supply.

Marshall, N. C.
Sealed proposals will be received by the Secretary of the Board of Aldermen, of the Town of Marshall, North Carolina, until 12:00 noon, May 20, 1922, for the furnishing and laying, approximately six (6) miles of Universal joint cast iron pipe, valves and fittings, pipe to be classes 100 and 130; construction of an intake dam, approx. 20 cu. yds concrete; and a 4000 gallon capacity secondary reservoir, R. F. concrete; with duplicate chlorine sterilizing units and house for same. Total estimated construction cost \$36,000.00.

Drawings and specifications on file at the office of T. A. Cox, jr. Engineer, 78 Patton Ave. Asheville, N. C. and at the office of the Secretary of the Board of Aldermen, Marshall, N. C. Copies may be obtained from the Engineer, mailed, upon request accompanied by check for \$5.00

Proposals must be upon the prescribed form, as furnished bidders upon request, to be enclosed in a sealed envelope bearing the name and address of the bidder, accompanied by a certified check drawn to the order of the "Treasurer of the Town of Marshall, N. C." for \$3500.00 as evidence of good faith. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned within ten days after opening of bids.

Alternate bids will be accepted for the construction work alone, (materials to be furnished by the Town,) which must be accompanied by certified check for \$1250.00.

The town reserves the right to reject any or all proposals and to furnish any or all materials required.

Klansmen Donate Money To Church.

Five Men in Uniform Visit Calvary Baptist Church, West Asheville, Sunday Night.

Robed in white uniform of the knights of the ku klux klan five men whose identity was concealed behind the white robes even extending over their white heads, visited the Calvary Baptist church in West Asheville during the Sunday evening service and donated \$25.00 to the church.

The five men approached the church in an automobile and at 8:15 o'clock entered. Then interrupted the service as they walked silently down the aisle to the altar and presented an envelope to the pastor, Rev. J. B. Grice. The envelope requested that the inclosed letter be read to the congregation, and while the klansmen stood at attention, Rev. Mr. Grice read the letter, pledging the support of the knights of the ku klux klan to the cause of religion.

Rev. Mr. Grice stated last night that the service was interrupted just as he was ready to read the scripture and he had no previous notice that the klansmen would visit the church. He said the money will be added to the fund for the new building.

The knights of the ku klux klan are affiliated with several other organizations in staging a series of mass meetings with "Americanism" as the topic, the first being held yesterday afternoon at the auditorium, with Representative Will D. Upshaw as the speaker. During his address the Georgia representative referred to the manner in which the Imperial Wizard of the secret order had been placed under investigation at Washington and how it had been halted when he offered a resolution asking for an investigation of all secret fraternal organizations. - Citizen

REPORT OF FIFTH SUNDAY MEETING

Madison County Summer School For Teachers will be Held in The Public School Building in The Town of Marshall June 19th, July 28th

The County Summer School for Madison County teachers will be held in Marshall from June 19, to July 28. The purpose of the County Summer School is to increase the efficiency of teachers of limited training and experience, and to build up ideals and a moral tone which will be reflected in their lives and activities in the community in which they teach.

Who should attend? 1. Prospective teachers coming into the ranks of the teaching profession who have completed at least two full years of high school work. Applicants who have not completed two full years of high school work will be admitted by passing an entrance examination on English Composition, Arithmetic, and United States History. Those unable to pass this examination may take the preparatory course. 2. Holders of Second-grade Certificates who are unable to present a statement showing completion of two full years of high school work will be admitted by passing the entrance examination. 3. Holders of Provisional B, Provisional A, and One-year Temporary Certificates should attend.

The following class of teachers may attend either a County Summer School or a State Summer school: 1. Graduates of standard high schools, 2. Holders of Provisional Elementary Certificates, 3. Holders of Provisional Elementary Certificates, of class A or class B.

The County Summer School does not give any credit toward raising a standard Certificate to a higher class, it only renews it. In order to secure credit for raising a Certificate it is necessary to attend a State Summer School.

All prospective or Second-grade teachers who present a statement showing two full years of high school work, or who pass the entrance examination, will be entitled to a Provisional B Certificate on completion of the Summer School work. Those taking the preparatory course will be given a Second-grade Certificate on successfully completing their course.

We would like to have all who expect to attend the Summer School write the County Superintendent as soon as possible.
