Presbyterians To Expend Funds on Region's School

Mrs. Bennett of Woman's Board Details Plan For Building

BIG ADDITION IN CITY IS PLANNED

Outlay Will Also Improve Dorland-Bell at Hot Springs

The expenditure of many thousands of dollars in the land of the Sky upon additional buildings for schools under jurisdiction of the Woman's Board of Home Mission of the Presbyterian church, U. S. A., is now definitely part of a building to be launched in the near future according to information gained from Mrs. Fred S. Bennett, of New York, head of the board who visited in Asheville during the past week.

The schools immediately in this section effected by the program are Dorland-Bell at Hot Springs, and the Asheville Normal and Associated schools, of Buncombe county.

At the former the 1923-24 building program contemplates the construction of an entirely new dormitory for boys, to take the place "The Willows" located several miles below the town of Hot Springs, on the French Broad river.

At the Farm school, Swannanoa, the building program contemplates the erection of dormitory space additional so that between 60 and 70 boys can be added to the present enrollment.

It is hoped to put up one of these two dormitory units by next year, the board president asserted. Recent additions to the equipment at Farm school along other lines has made it possible to increase the student in this manner, she pointed out.

With the purchase of 240 acres of mountain land, known as the Hensley property, adjacent to the Dixie highway below Hot Springs, and situated at an elevation above the "willows" farm site, the construction of a modern dormitory for boys with a capacity of about 60, is the plan under consideration at Dorland-Bell. This would mean the doubling of the enrollment of boys. It would likely that the farm would be retained intact, as the farmer's residence.

While the new tract lies at some distance from the town, the problem of transportation is made easy by reason of the Dixie highway passing the property. Trucks could be used. Mrs. Bennett asserted, to haul freight and supplies, and to bring the pupils to town to attend Dorland-Bell.

Believe Escaping Prisoners Have Aid of Guards in Yancey County.

The fact that 21 of the 52 state convicts maintained in the camp at Boone Ford in Yancey county have escaped since January 1st, and there have been at least two attempts to dynamite the camp and release all the prisoners, has resulted in a decision on the part of George Ross Pou, superintendent of the state prison, to move the camp to Mount Holly, where it will be combined with another camp, according to information received here.

The superintendent in writing of the situation has expressed the opinion that the prisoners are making their escape with the aid of the guards in that section. The regularity with which the prisoners from this camp, together with the fact that guns of guards have been found loaded with blanks, convinced the superintendent that the guards employed are aiding the escapes. Native guards have to be employed. Most of the prisoners are mountaineers and it is believed that the guards help their friends to escape. It is practically impossible to get guards from the central prison to Yancey county.

The superintendent took a number of emergency guards who will help him transfer the prisoners from Yancey to Gaston county where they will be incorporated with another camp of prisoners hired out to construction firms. The owners of the fields and mines have protested against the removal of the prisoners and some of them, including J. W. Pless, of Marion, and J. E. Stickleather, of Asheville, have appealed to the governor, it is stated.

Among prisoners who recently escaped from the camp was Monroe Hensley, sentenced from Buncombe county for second degree murder. Hensley, however, later surrendered himself.

Cry Of Fallen

Wall's Subject.

Goldsboro Minister Delivers Powerful Sermon At Ninth Avenue Baptist.

"The Cry of the Fallen" was the subject of a powerful sermon delivered Saturday night by Rev. Dr. Zeno Wall, pastor of the First Baptist church, at Goldsboro, who for the last two weeks has been conducting a series of evangelistic services at the Ninth Avenue Baptist church.

Much interest has been shown in the meetings, which will come to a close Sunday night. Dr. Wall will preach twice Sunday. Edgar Lynch is in charge of the music and has added neither come hither to draw." John

"The woman saith unto Him, Sir, give me this water, that I thirst not, neither come higher to draw." John 4:15, was the text of the sermon.

Dr. Wall said: "I love to study the Gospel because it finds men 'down and out' and tells them how they can get up and out. It is the only book, the only philosophy which offers hope and encouragement to the one who has fallen by the wayside. The Gospel which certain scientists have preached for hundreds of years is the Gospel of the survival of the fittest, a Gospel which tells how the strong of body, the alert of mind and the courageous of spirit are to triumph; how the weak must give way to the strong, the timid to the courageous, and the foolish to the wise.

They, in a word, have no place in their scheme of life—their philosophy—for the weak, for those who, through misfortune or otherwise, have been compelled to take an obscure place.

But not so with the Gospel of Christ, for he offers sight to the blind, health to the diseased, happiness to the feeble, and victory to the defeated. His is the Gospel of the revival of the

unfit instead of the survival of the fit.

"There are three pictures in this story which I want to hold before you. The first is that of the wearied Savior, the second, that of the wayward sinner, and the third, that of the working saint. If you fail to see the face of Jesus you, in my judgment, fail to see the most beautiful and inspiring thing in our story. Jesus is seated yonder at Jacob's well, for the disciples to return the sinner to come to get water, waiting, second, for the disciples to return from the city where they had gone for bread, and while he sat the woman, after whom many question marks appeared, came for water. Jesus asked her for a drink, and then led her to see herself as she really was—lost, "dead in trespasses and sins." He told her about his Living Water, and she cries out, Sir give me this water.

"The second picture, therefore reveals the fallen woman unto us, and enables us to hear her cry—a cry for that which the Savior only gives—living water, pardon, and cleansing, a new name, a new heart, and a new start, all of which Jesus gave her.

"The third, and last picture is that of the working saint, for soon after Jesus cleansed her she was seen en route to the town, of Sychar nearly two miles away to tell the men with whom she had been living in sin about Him who had saved her, given her a new start in life, and a boost. The men were soon coming in streams to see Jesus, and many believed on Him because of the saying of the woman, "He told me all things that ever I did." Poor out-cast her poor fallen soul. Jesus can save you, and greatly use you if you will but let him. He has ever been the hope of the future, the fallen the outcast. He has never turned a single person away. He will not turn you away."
