Water From Hunter Creek Runs Into Marshall July 6, 1923

The people of Marshall gather-

ed on the street in front of the Court House about 6:30 p. m. Friday 6th day of July to see a stream of water gush from the fire plug, which was coming! through the water pipes from the intake on Hunter Creek across Redmon Mountain into the resevior down into the town of Marshall. Everybody seemed happy The town has been out of water for some time. The occasion reminded one, when Moses struck the rock in the dry wilderness and abundance of water gushed forth. It seems a most too good. to believe-a living stream of water coming from the head of Hunter Creek more than 6 miles away across Redmon mountain some 700 feet, above the town then down into the town to supply the people with water and to quench the thirst of the people of the county when they come to Marshall, Saturday morning the reservoirs were over flowing and the water gushing with force and beanty from the fire plucs from one end of Marshall to the other. It will be bout a mounth before the water pleted, when it is finished there will be an unceasing 6 inch stream of pure spring water flowing from the head of Hunter Creek through the cast iron pipes into the town of Marshall. All honor to those who are responsible for this God send to putting over the gravity water system. The town has already a continuous flow of water. These fountains will be placed as soon as possible. We are told they will be set and in full force before the August term of court. We are informed that it was stated upon the instilation of the new board by members of the retiring board that the injunction suit against the sale of the water bonds cost the town about 7,000.00 all told and delayed the instillation of the water system about 6 months. However that may be we are all now for the water and we are all for the best interest and building up of our town. With this splendid water system installed we elieve it means much for Marshall and Madison county.

Because of the absen e of one of the newly elected aldermen the installation of the new officers was deferred until Friday, July 6th. On Friday night J. M. Baley, Z. V. Fisher, and J. C. Redmon were sworn into office by the retiring mayor Dr. W. A. Sams. Because of the disability of J. H. White, who was elected mayor for the town of Marshall on the first Tuesday in May 1923, he was not able to take the oath and to be inducted nto office. There was some question among the lawyers as to whether or not Dr. W. A. Sams held over as mayor under the statute or wdether there was already a vacancy. In order to remove all doubt about the ques tion Dr. Sams very graciously offered his resignation to take effect immediately, and stated that he did not care to serve longer and that he had helped to accomplish the great purpose which was the idol of his ambition to establish a gravity water system for the town of Marshall. The resignation of Dr. Sams was accepted, if such resignation was necessary, and John Jarrett was elected to fill the vacancy with the understanding that he would give way to Mr. White in the event that Mr. White became able to perform the duties of mayor for the town of Marshall. Mr. J. M. Baley was elected secretary and treasurer for the town and Mr. John A. Hendricks was re-elected attorney and Lon Powers was re-elected chief of police for the town of Marshall.
