FROM MARS HILL

Commencement is the first week in May. Dr. W. C. Tyree of Lenoir will preach the sermon on Sunday, May 2. Judge John A. Oates of Fayetteville is to give the annual address on Thursday, May 6, and on the day following Dr. O. R. Mangum of Oxford gives the Alumni address. The alumni dinner comes on Thursday evening. Mr. T. L. Johnson of Lumberton is President of this organization.

Copy for the new catalogue is now in the hands of the printers. It will show an enrollment of 532 during the regular session, 100 coming from thirteen other states, the District of Columbia, China, Cuba, and Canada, the remainder from 73 North Carolina counties. Sixty enrolled as ministerial students, and 265 in the Junior College. The college graduating class numbers 75.

There will be few changes in the faculty for the coming session. Three teachers will complete work for the Master's degree at the University in June. The head of every department in the junior college will have the Master's degree before the opening of the next session. Two new teachers join us next year: Rev. A. S. Gillespie, who finishes at Wake Forest in June, makes the fifth member of the department of English; and Mr. R. M. Lee, Principal of Yancey Collegiate Institute for the past three years, becomes Associate in the department of History and Economics.

The twelve weeks' summer school, directed by Professor I. N. Carr, begins on June 6 and closes on September 4. The Baptist Mountain Assembly comes between the two terms—July 20 to 29. There will also be a Steward Conference of Ministers under the direction of Dr. Walt N. Johnson; this will be held early in August. Thus the school plant will be in denominational service practically twelve months in the year.

The faculty and students of M. H. S. are very busy preparing for commencement exercises.

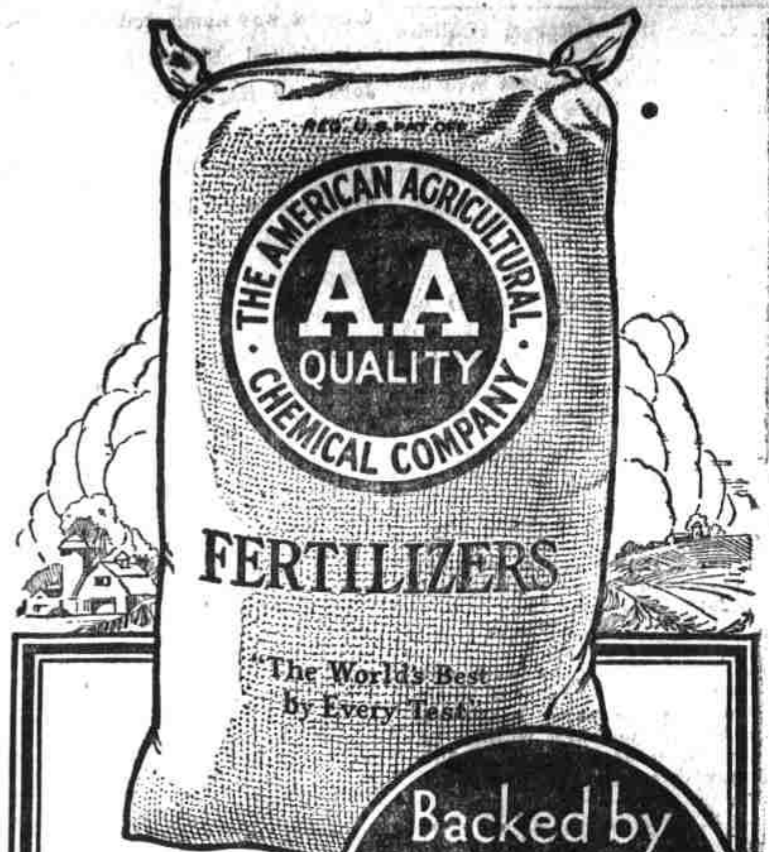
Miss Ruby E. Rogers celebrated her 18th birthday Saturday evening, April 3, 1926, at her home in Mars Hill.
