I did receive the sum of \$1697.79, the balance due on a two thousand dollar policy which was made payable to me, and upon which Mr. White had corrowed some money before his death., Of the bove amount I had to use the sum of \$741.30 to meet my own obligations, leaving me \$956.49 after my husband's death. In order to save even the above amount I had to pay the premium on Mr. White's insurance policy out of my own funds to keep the policy safe. This is the truth about the insurance money. If I were worth the tenth part what some people claim I certainly would not
