Week before last an item was sent in from Rev. that Mrs. Dock Gosnell of Piney Grove had given birth to triplets. That item was all right if it had been true, but it develops that this report was not true. Last week two items were given in the Walnut Gap news which were evidently sent through ill feeling. Apparently they were all right, but those who knew the facts tell us they were sent in because of ill feeling between families. Other false items have appeared from that section of the county—or if not false, they were intended to offend. Any person who will try to air a family row through a newspaper is a coward and this paper will not hesitate to expose their names if this practice is continued.
