REV. E. W. MORGAN DEAD

Rev. E. W. Morgan of Asheville, N. C., died at the French Broad Hospital on June 2, 1928. Mr. Morgan has been in poor health for some time. He was 76 years old and had been a citizen of Asheville for more than 40 years. He was a Baptist minister and had been preaching the gospel for 52 years. He was widely known in Buncombe county and in the adjoining counties. Funeral services were at his home at Woodfin Sunday at 10:00 a.m. and services were conducted by Dr. Wallace of West Asheville. His many friends attested their sorrow by being present to the number of about five hundred. The remains were laid to rest in the Asheville Riverside cemetery. He is survived by his wife Mary Morgan and two daughters of Asheville, one sister Eureka Morgan of Democrat, N. C., three brothers J. G. Morgan of Stockville, M. T. Morgan of Mars Hill and E. S. Morgan of Marshall, R. 2.
