BOARD OF EDUCATION DOES NOT ASK FOR \$1.11 RATE

The budget of the Board of Education for this year is \$5,204.88 less than last year, the tax rate for last year was only 90 cents. Whereas the County Commissioners state that the rate for this year will be \$1.11. According to the budget that we presented to the County Commissioners the school rate would be approximately 90 cents. All other items that go to make the \$1.11 rate have been added to our budget since we presented it to the County Commissioners. We do not think it fair to the Boarl of Edu-cation for this increase to be made in our budget and published in the news-puper, leaving the impression on the people that we are the cause of high taxes. We have made our budget as small as possible, in order to help keep the tax rate down.

Last year we lived within our Budget and had a balance of \$4,792.87. We feel that we can do the same again on a 90 per cent rate.
