RECORDS SHOW HOOVER OF GERMAN EXTRACTION

BALTIMORE, MD., July 22.—That Herbert Hoover, Republican candidate for president, is of German extraction is shown by records at Frederick County Court House, here. These show that his great-great-great-grandfather came to this country from Germany about 1740. The original Hoover whose name was Andrew owned land at Linwood, on a branch of Little Pipe Creek, Carroll County, at that time a part of Frederick County. Miss Ruth Fealer, social secretary to Hoover, found interesting details of the early life of the Hoovers in old land records at the court house yesterday. She also visited parts of Carroll County, where it was thought Andrew Hoover once lived. From information given through the records and other data it was found that Andrew Hoover after living for 15 or 20 years in what was formerly Frederick County, removed to North Carolina, where his son, John, was born. The son of John was Jesse, who also lived in North Carolina. The son of Jesse, Eli, was born in Ohio. The son of Eli, Jesse Clark Hoover, was born in Iowa and the son of Jesse Clark Hoover is Herbert Clark Hoover, the presidential candidate.—Copied.

FORD TRAINS SERVICE MEN

Absolute uniformity of service on the new Ford Model "A" cars and model "AA" trucks is being maintained by the Ford Motor Company through a plan which involves the training, in the Ford plants, of ten thousand garage mechanics. The Ford branch plants, and the Detroit factories have assumed the character of a gigantic training school, to which every Ford dealer in the United States is sending one or more representatives.

This school for service men began with the training of superintendents and foremen of the thirty-six branch plants of the company in the United States. Before the Model "A" Ford car was introduced, these men from the branch plants were being schooled in the Ford factories near Detroit in the manufacture and assembly of the new car. They returned to the thirty-six Ford branches and immediately began the training of men for dealers in their respective territories. The men come in relays, each group as large as the branch plant can handle conveniently. The groups are purposely kept small, in order that the most intensive training can be given. WHAT THE AMERICAN RED CROSS HAS ACCOMPLISHED DURING THE LAST YEAR

1. In Porto Rico the American Red Cross has a half million homeless and destitute persons under its care, and in Florida there are 50,000 persons looking to it for assistance as a result of the tropical hurricane which swept out of the Caribbean Sea in September and cut a path of destruction over a fifteen hundred mile course. A relief fund of about \$5,500,000 has been raised with which the organization is preventing intense suffering and in many instances actual starvation.
2. During the organization's fiscal year which closed June 30th it gave assistance following 88 disasters 66 of which were in this country and 22 abroad.
3. Its workers in nearly 3,000 chapters in the United States have assisted an average of 40,500 service and ex-service men each month, helping them to settle government claims and procure hospital treatment and seeing that their families did not suffer while these claims were pending. At the same time Red Cross workers in camps and hospitals assisted an average of nearly 16,000 men each month and arranged during the year more than 22,000 recreation and entertainment events.
4. Carrying on civilian relief activities only where there is no other agency to do it—mostly in small towns and rural sections—the Red Cross has assisted more than 10,000 families during the year.
5. In communities throughout the United States and in our Insular and Foreign possessions, its 745 Public Health nurses have been fighting disease and suffering and improving the health standards of the nation. They have made more than a million visits to homes during the year to care for the sick and protect the well. 874,000 school children have been inspected and given assistance in having their physical defects corrected.
6. Nearly 60,000 women and girls have been taught, in the organizations Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick

7. In their fight against malnutrition, the cause of many physical defects in children and adults, the organization has given nutrition instruction to 128,000 persons of whom 122,000 were children.
8. With 90,000 persons a year dying as a result of accidents, the American Red Cross is waging a nation wide campaign to reduce this annual loss of life. In the last twelve months it has instructed more than 150,000 persons in the United States in first aid to the injured, while the number of persons enrolled in its life saving corps after receiving intensive instruction in methods for rescuing and reviving the drowned persons, has reached nearly 174,000. During the year it has also given more than 4,000 lectures and demonstrations for the furtherance of this campaign.
9. In addition to helping with the administrative and other phases of the work, Red Cross volunteers have during the year, produced more than a quarter of a million garments and two and quarter million surgical dressings for use in disaster relief work and other contingencies. They have also transcribed 1,816 volumes into Braille, a system of raised lettering whereby the blind are enabled to read. Practically all Braille transcribing in this country is done by Red Cross volunteers.
10. The American Red Cross makes no appeals for funds during the year except following great national disasters in which cases all funds contributed are spent for relief work in the disaster for which the appeal is made. This entire program of service is financed from membership dues obtained during the Roll Call. In addition to this the membership funds finance many relief operations following relatively small disasters in which no special appeal is made.

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MADISON VOTE ATTRACTS STATE-WIDE INTEREST

With the two presidential candidates, Herbert Hoover and Governor Alfred E. Smith, of New York, running a close race in North Carolina, one of the most important states of the Solid South, from midnight Tuesday until late Wednesday afternoon, official returns from strong partisan counties like Madison County were being awaited with much interest by candidates and members of both parties throughout the State, while the State press, including the Associated Press, made arrangements for securing the returns immediately following the precinct and total counts, due to their importance.

Approximately 4500 Republican and 1300 Democratic voters were registered in Madison, with the final counts giving the County an overwhelming majority on the credit side of the Republican ticket, while all Democrat candidates on the State and National tickets were far in the minority.

The returns from Madison were covered both Tuesday night and Wednesday by the Marshall Citizen correspondent, for the Associated Press, the International News Service, the Asheville Citizen, the Charlotte Observer, the Charlotte News, the Raleigh Times, the Raleigh News and Observer, and the Greensboro Daily News, while all these dailies and a number of others in the State were given additional coverage Wednesday morning and afternoon.

One of the G. O. P. strongholds of the State, the huge vote in Madison was a large factor in giving Hoover a lead of approximately 25,000 votes in North Carolina which for months had been conceded as Smith territory.
