## GENERAL NEWS IN PARAGRAPHS

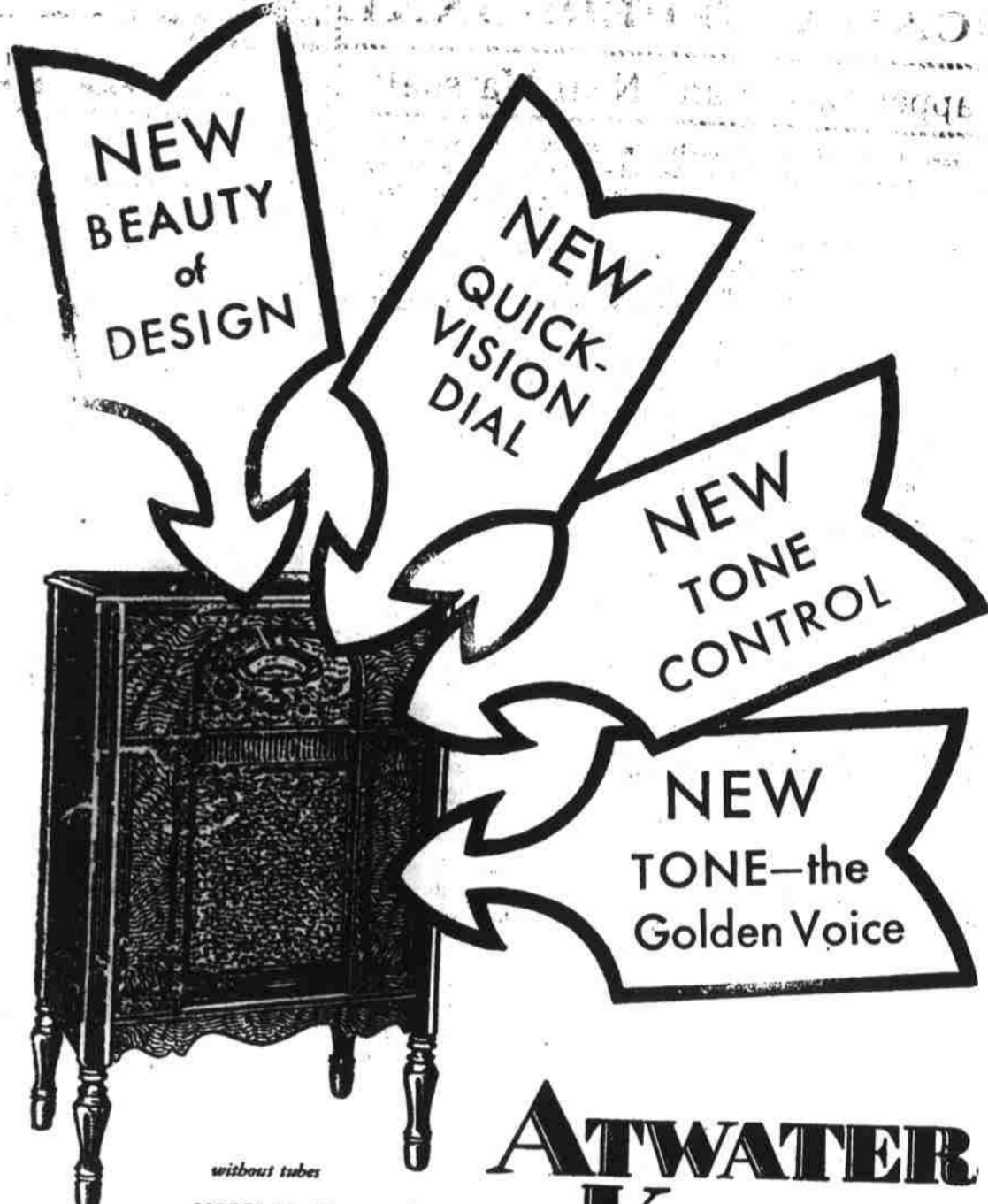

The Standard Oil Company filling station at Black Mountain, N. C., was blown up early Monday morning and robbed of \$375 in cash and \$100 in checks, the robbers fleeing in a speeding car. The entire town was aroused when the explosion occurred. It is thought that the explosive used was nitro-glycerine. The safe door was blown completely across State Highway No. 10, where the filling station is located at Montreat road. According to officers, had the robbers remained in the filling station and had they been there when the explosion occurred, they would have been blown to pieces.

Robert Wark and Eddie L. Brown, Seattle fliers, hopped off Sunday for the Yukon territory in Alaska on the first leg of their four-stop flight to Tokyo, Japan, starting from Tacoma, Washington.

A deep sea diver Sunday covered the bodies of the two girl passengers and pilot of an airplane that plunged through a gigantic steel tank and sank in the water underneath in one of the most unusual accidents of aviation history. It is believed that the plane was struck by lightning Sunday afternoon, plunging straight down from a 1,000 foot altitude.
