U. S. TOBACCO EXPORTS IN-REASE IN FIRST HALF OF YEAR: Exports of all types of tobacco leaf from the United States showed an increase of approximately 17 per cent in volume during the first six months of the current year as compared with the similar period of 1928, according to the Tobacco Division, Department of Commerce.

The total for the 1930 period is 260,268,347 pounds, an increase of \$63,193,978 for last year. 222,491,533 for last year's period increase in value from the United to \$55,123,830 in 1980.
