The New York State banking department says that a good deal of this money has been unclaimed for many years. The same condition no

doubt exists in 'most every bank in the country that has been operating over a period of several years.

Regardless of whether we heed advice to reach for this or that, the people of the United States spend more money for sweets than they do for electricity in their homes, according to figures of the Department of Commerce. The candy bill is a little more than two cents a day for each person, while the electric bill for those in electrified homes is a little less than two cents a day for each person, on an average.
