## TWO KILLED, ONE HURT IN TRUCK CRASH

Two men are dead and a third was seriously injured as a result of an automobile-truck accident Thursday last week at the intersection of Sugar Fork road and highway No. 695, near Democrat, in Buncombe county.

The dead are: Glenn Radford, 21, farmer of Buckner, Madison county. Alvin Robinson, 21, farmer of Candler.

The injured man was Oather Robinson, 24, of Candler, brother of Alvin Robinson and driver of the truck. Oather Robinson had severe scalp lacerations and possible internal injuries. He was taken to Aston Park hospital.

Radford was killed instantly and Alvin Robinson died in a hospital in Asheville three hours after the accident from a fractured skull. Radford's neck was broken, officers said.

The accident occurred, officers said, when the driver of the truck, that was loaded with lumber, tried to avoid a collision with a small coupe. The truck went over a 30-foot embankment into Ivy creek. The three men were riding in the cab of the truck.

## DR. C. C. PULLEY PASSES AWAY

Prominent Druggist of Marshall Buried in Knoxville

Carey Cleveland Pulley, age 49, for three years pharmacist at Moore's Pharmacy in Marshall, died Sunday afternoon about 6 o'clock after a brief illness. He suffered an attack of acute indigestion about five o'clock Saturday morning and with a weak heart succumbed just as he entered Aston Park hospital Sunday afternoon. The body was shipped to Knoxville for funeral and interment, Dr. Pulley having been a druggist in Knoxville about fifteen years before coming to Marshall the first of September, 1931. His former home was Prospect Station, Tenn., near Nashville. He is survived by his wife, who was Mrs. Prince, and a step-son, Fred Prince, of Knoxville. He is survived by one brother, Luther Pulley, of Dallas, Texas, and two sisters, Mrs. G. C. Case and Mrs. O. L. Biles, of Prospect Station, Tenn. Dr. Pulley was a member of Cumberland Presbyterian church at Knoxville and a member of the Masonic order. Dr. Pulley was a good man and fine citizen, attending strictly to his business. The many friends of the family in Marshall are shocked at his sudden and unexpected going, and regret that Mrs. Pulley and her son will leave Marshall to make their home in Knoxville.

## Out For Solicitor Of This District

Coming as one of the first utterances of the approaching campaign is the announcement this week of J. Marvin Glance of Asheville that an active campaign will be waged by him for the office of Solicitor of the 19th Judicial district which embraces Madison and Buncombe counties.

Mr. Glance is a native of Madison County having been born at Cross Rock in Number 6 township. He moved to the Leicester section of Buncombe county with his parents when he was about two years old. He still lives in the Leicester community where he owns his home. He has been actively engaged in the practice of law in Asheville for many years and has frequently appeared in the courts at Marshall.

The candidate for solicitor has been identified with the Republican party since early childhood, having forsaken the political set-up of a long line of fore-parents when yet a small boy and has worked unflinchingly for the success of his party since long before he became old enough to vote.

In his announcement Mr. Glance says he stands squarely on the platform adopted by the Republican state convention held recently in Charlotte. In addition thereto he offers his personal platform as follows:

"The ends of Justice demand a fair, clean, fearless and honest operation of the courts; free from any semblance of persecution and unaffected by the personal opinions or feelings of the prosecuting attorney and with a minimum expense to the taxpayers. I pledge my sacred honor to the faithful observance of this principle, if elected."

The candidate also stated: "I shall appreciate the support of every voter in the district. The record of my life as an individual and as a lawyer is open to the public. I welcome a most searching investigation into every phase of it. I have no promises to make other than the fearless performance of the duties placed upon the Solicitor to the very best of my skill and ability. The campaign I shall make will be as clean and dignified as I know how to make it. I abhor mud slinging and I shall not stoop to such tactics."
