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## REPUBLICANS SWEEP MADISON AS DEMOCRATS SWEEP STATE AND NATION

### MUCH INTEREST SHOWN IN ELECTION RETURNS DISPLAYED BY THIS PAPER

#### TOO MUCH DISORDER ON STREETS ELECTION NIGHT

The election Tuesday resulted in a sweeping victory for the Republicans in Madison County, while the state and nation went Democratic. For County offices, Herschel Sprinkle (R), defeated Fred Freeman (D), for Representative; Guy English (R), defeated C. M. Burnett (D), for Sheriff; Jeter P. Ramsey (R), defeated Mrs. Pearl Rector for Register of Deeds; and for County Commissioners, William V. Farmer, B. E. Guthrie and T. A. Higgins, defeated their Democratic opponents, S. Brigman, E. E. Bryan and T. A. Woody. J. Marvin Gance, and Calvin R. Edney, for Solicitor and Congress, respectively, piled up substantial majorities in Madison County, but were defeated in their districts by their Democratic opponents, Zeb V. Nettles and A. L. Bulwinkle, respectively. W. K. McLean (D), of Marshall, was defeated by J. P. Gibbs (R), for the State Senate. Several drunks were jailed as returns came in. Fire Sunday evening about 6 o'clock destroyed the home of Delbert Silver at Petersburg. The fire was caused when gasoline was poured into a stove by Mr. Silver's daughter, who thought it was kerosene. She was uninjured.

Besides the building, all the furniture and personal belongings of the family were burned. The only things saved were canned goods and stored produce in a cellar near the house. There was no insurance.

#### CHARLES DEAVER DIED IN ASHEVILLE

Marshall Young Man Found Sunday Night Never Regained Consciousness

Charles Deaver, 25, of Marshall, who was found unconscious near his home Sunday night, died Wednesday afternoon in an Asheville hospital from his injuries.

Deaver, a section hand for the Southern railway, lived about 20 yards from the railway tracks and officers first believed he had been struck by a passing train. He did not regain consciousness.

Later Madison County officers arrested Ervin Henaley, 25, of the Bear Creek section, and Robert Lunsford, 50, of Hot Springs, for investigation in the case.

An inquest into Deaver's death will be conducted at 4:00 Thursday afternoon at Marshall by Dr. W. A. Sams, coroner.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete last night. Deaver is survived by his widow, Mrs. Kate Deaver; three children; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Deaver; and a brother, James Deaver.

### RED CROSS

While the funds subscribed in membership drives are divided, this year the amount which remained in the local chapter has been applied to local cases which needed help. Many of these which needed additional funds for necessary treatment have been aided and little by little these will be reported on.

In one of the towns of the county a little child had been seriously hurt and only an operation or treatment in hospital could cure. The family did not have sufficient resources to do this and the local members of the Red Cross asked aid which was given by paying the hospital bill. The doctors did their part gratis.

Another case which was taken care of, altho in vain: A little child was in bad case with tonsils, adenoids and resultant ills. Pleas had been made to R. C. for aid and finally sufficient funds being in hand, the case was sent to the hospital. Unfortunately the child died under the operation, but the bill was paid for the operating room.

In another section a small girl suffered from St. Vitus dance due to various causes. The child was sent to the clinic but nothing could be done for her, but R. C. tried to do something.

During the year many pounds of yeast have been given to those suffering from pellagra in the county thru different dispensing agents with improvement in many.

Thus the members of the chapter have been helping the unfortunate ones where other agencies could not.

Next week other work will be described.

### DESPITE RAINY DAY HOT SPRINGS COMMUNITY FAIR QUITE A SUCCESS

#### EXHIBITS AND SPEAKING INDOORS

The Hot Springs Community fair, sponsored by the Parent-Teacher association, was held Wednesday of last week in the high school building. Although the day was rainy, the fair was a decided success. Several hundred people attended.

The scheduled parade had to be abandoned at 10 o'clock and the field day exercises, which were to have been put on in the afternoon, had to be cancelled also.

#### Baby Show Is Feature

The fair opened with a baby show which attracted much attention. Prizes were awarded for the best baby between two weeks and six months, and six months and three years, of age. Velma Laughter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Laughter, won the prize in the younger group, and Billie Jack Price, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Price, won in the group between six months and three years.

Columbus Anderson, field representative of the North Carolina emergency relief administration, spoke at 11 o'clock on the subject of "Community Co-operation." He particularly stressed better farming, better home-making, closer co-operation in all lines of work, and better citizenship.

At the conclusion of his address, he presented to the school and to the community at large, the community house, erected on the school grounds by CWA funds under the direction of Mrs. Warren T. Davis, county administrator. Mrs. Charles Burgin, chairman of the Parent-Teacher association, on behalf of the school and the community, made the speech of acceptance. The Morristown brass band then gave several numbers, which added much to the enjoyment of the crowd. Lunch was served in the community house to the members of the band and several prominent visitors.

#### Prize Awarded

At 1 o'clock, the crowd again assembled in the school auditorium, and between band numbers, several talks were made and prizes to the winners of the exhibits were awarded. Frank Chance, superintendent of the Tobacco experiment station, in Greene county, Tenn., gave a brief outline of his work, and extended an invitation to all tobacco growers to visit his farm next year and see what was being done. Bob Inman and F. A. Cavender, secretaries, respectively, of the Morristown and Greeneville, Tenn., chambers of commerce, gave short talks.

At the conclusion of the meeting, the winners of the various exhibits were announced, and prizes awarded. The first prize winners were: Tommie E. H. A. Grennell; corn and tomatoes, Mrs. G. W. Corbett; peaches, Mrs. W. T. Parker; jelly, Mrs. Hubert Pangle; butter, Mrs. Dennis Church; best collection of variety of canned goods, Mrs. C. C. Brown; best collection of canned goods from relief families, Ed Lanford; most individual blue ribbons, Mrs. Jennings Davis, peaches, beans, corn, and tomatoes.

Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Brown were awarded a prize for being the oldest married couple on the grounds, their ages being 81 and 82 respectively. They have been married more than 61 years.

It was decided to hold another fair early in October next year and every one voiced the opinion that this, the first one, was a big success, and well worth working for.
