They were there the next day at dawn.

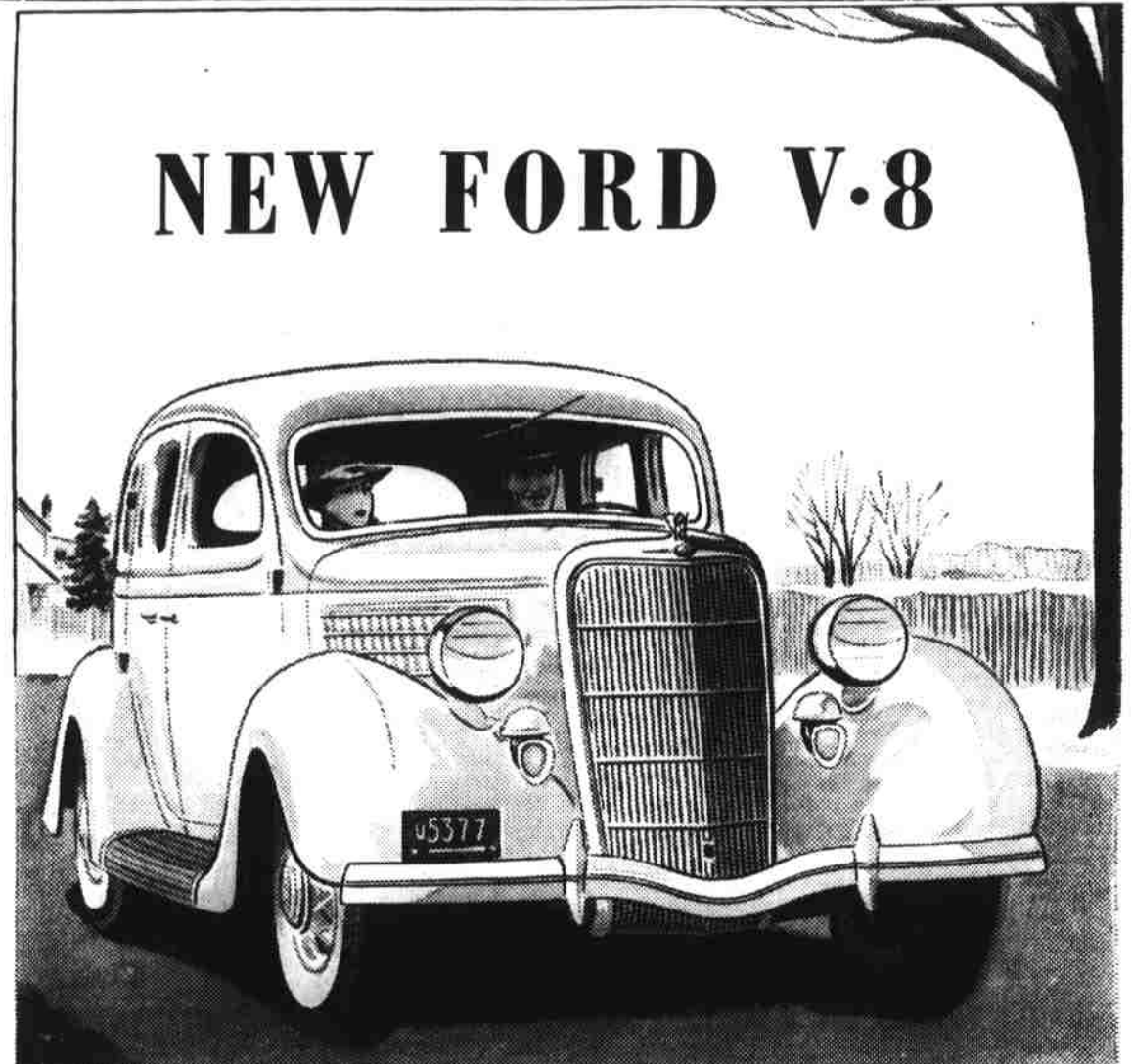
