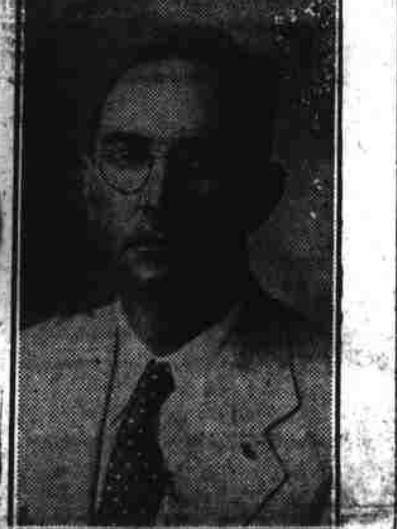
### X-Ray Installed
