Sleep And Efficiency

By Israel Bram, M. D.

In the order of their importance the vital requirements of life are air, water, aleep and food. We cannot live without air for more than a small fraction of an hour. We cannot exist without water for more than a few days. Two weeks without sleep usually results in death from exhaustion. Without food, life becomes extinct within 15 to 60 days, depending upon the individual's health and weight at the beginning of the fast period. To be of normal quality and duration our vegetative existence (I mean an existence without consideration of brain function) depends upon the presence in satisfactory proportion follows: "I find seven or eight hours of fresh air and water, adequate of sleep quite sufficent and have no sleep and a proper dietary.
