ATTENTION VOTERS

We the undersigned have been appointed by a committee of the State Bar Association as Republican and Democratic Sponsors of the Constitutional Amendment which provides for the increase of the membership of the State Supreme Court from five to seven Justices. This proposed amendment is non-partisan and non-political and deserves the support of the voters of Madison County, regardless of what political party they might be affiliated with.

North Carolina needs these additional justices by reason of the fact that we have almost twice as large a population, and twice as much work for our Supreme Court as any other state in the Union having as few Justices as we have on their Court of last resort. This of necessity overworks the members of our Court and keeps them from having the time they should have to devote to writing opinions of cases heard in our court.

For these reasons we recommend and urge the Voters of Madison County to vote for this proposed amendment.

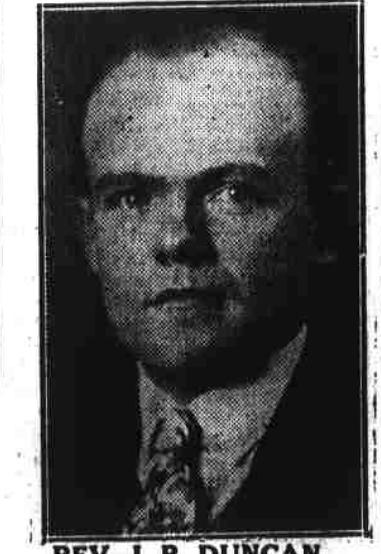
AN APPEAL

Last week's game with Canton was one of the best games ever played in this section. On a double reverse play, Carter, Mars Hill halfback, skirted right end for 60 yards and a touchdown. Whitaker dropkicked the extra point. This was the only score of the game which was hard fought throughout.

Lyric Rice Dies Suddenly In Marshall

Lyric Rice, age 76, of the Middle Fork section of Madison County came to Marshall Monday on a business trip and died while in Marshall. He was not in good health but his going was quite a surprise and shock to his friends and neighbors. Death was the result of a hemorrhage of the brain. He was out in front of the courthouse conversing with Mr. Jake Merril, a friend and former neighbor, and suddenly began to topple over, calling on Mr. Merril to catch him. He was taken to the office of Dr. Sams, where he received treatment, but died in a few minutes. Funeral services were to be held at 10:00 o'clock Wednesday from Bethel church, interment to follow in the church cemetery. He is survived by his second wife, two sons and two daughters. The sons reside in Detroit, Michigan, one daughter at home and another daughter in Asheville. Mr. Rice was a well known and highly respected citizen of his community, taking an active interest in politics. He was at one time deputy sheriff and held other positions of honor in his party.

LOANS IN MADISON COUNTY

THE NATIONAL EMERGENCY COUNCIL

Durham, N. C., October 23, 1936. In Madison County, 137 loans were closed in the amount of \$141,200.00 by the Federal Land Bank and the Land Bank Commission, from May 1, 1933 through June 30, 1936, according to information received by Robert M. Gantt, State Director for the National Emergency Council for North Carolina.

Of the loans closed in Madison County, 22 loans for \$33,000.00 were made by the Federal Land Bank and 115 loans totaling \$108,200.00 by the Land Bank Commission.

Through the agency of the Farm Credit Administration in North Carolina \$47,870,990.00 have been loaned during the same period. These loans included 5,056 of Federal Land Bank loans for \$11,741,100; 12,905 Land Bank Commission loans in the amount of \$17,221,274; 46,054 Production Credit Association loans totaling \$12,562,243; and 82,269 emergency crop loans amounting to \$6,345,476.

In addition to refinancing loans through the Farm Credit Administration, the farmers in North Carolina were benefited also by a reduction mortgage principal which amounted to \$3,385,600. Further savings resulting from lowered interest rates are estimated at \$490,000 annually.

In the period May 1, 1933, through June 30, 1936, 765,674 mortgage loans, totaling \$2,056,156,826 were made, and \$1,391,373,603 was advanced in loans to cooperatives, while \$318,878,072 was loaned to cooperatives by the agencies of the Farm Credit Administration in the United States.
