through Tuesday night, Feb. 8, are Practices on which assistance is available under this year's program are:

Seeding permanent pasture or hay: additional vegetative cover in crop rotation; liming materials on cropland; initial establishments of contour striperopping on non-terraced land to protect soil from water or wind erosion; forest tree planting; improvement of permanent pasture or hay; constructing or enlarging permanent drainage ditches for the purpose of draing cropland or pasture land for which proper outlets are provided; installation of field drain tile on farm land to dispose of excess water; winter cover crops (requests to be made in Fall); year round cover; application of minerals to restore stand and growth of permanent vegetative cover.

Approvals will be made at this time on practices to be performed during this spring only. Soil tests will be needed for practices No. 3, "Liming materials on cropland," and No. 19, "Application of minerals, etc." Fertilizer and lime requirements may be met on other practices by using a minimum amount per acre in the
