

U. S. Dist. Judge Robert L. Taylor of Tennessee Thursday acquitted Zeno Ponder of Alexander R-1, N. C., of a charge of violating federal to- and from County Capital Outlay bacco production marketing laws.

Taylor directed a verdict of acquittal for Ponder on motion of Assistant U. S. Dist. Atty. John F. Dugger. Dugger told Taylor that after a thorough investigation of the case he could find no evidence of wrongdoing by Ponder.

Taylor said he agreed with the government attorney and commented from the bench he was "glad" to dismiss the charge against the North Carolina farmer.
