## ATTENDANCE MAY TOP 100,000 AT N. C. STATE FAIR

Raleigh, Oct. 19 - By the thousands, youngsters and oldsters flocked through the turnstiles at the big North Carolina State Fair as attendance continued heavy.

More than 75,000 had visited the fair today by late afternoon, according to an estimate by Highway Department officials. Attendance tonight was expected to boost the day's total figure over the 100,000-mark.

The many concession stands were doing a big business in the sale of cotton candy, hot dogs and candied apples. On the midway, teeming crowds moved back and forth amid the chatter of side show barkers.
