REMODELING OF N. C. CONSTITUTION

Tryon, Oct. 25 - Western Disrict U. S. Attorney James M. Baley alling of a constitutional convention for the purpose of drafting a new tate constitution. Baley addressed ference in Charleston, W. Va. meeting of the League of Women Joters here.

Terming our present constitution dopted in 1868 as a "relic of Recontruction Days" and "long outmodd." Baley stated that revision of our basic law was required by the hanging economic and social conlitions of modern times.

He eautioned, however, that any revision must be approached from a completely nonpartisan viewpoint and with a real desire for improvenent in the machinery of our state! sovernment. Otherwise any proosed constitution will have little hance of ratification by popular ote, he pointed out.

"The adoption of a modern, proressive state constitution would be a challenge to the best and most enightened political leadership of both parties," Baley remarked, "but there a no reason why it should be beyond the group that we want he reach of an informed citizenry."

Among subjects Baley listed for consideration were provisions for restoration of local self-government vithin counties, giving to the governor the right of veto, mandatory reand values are based on Madison apportionment of Legislative memsan selection of judges, bipartisan representation upon state commiszions, adoption of a fair election iaw, establishment of a civil service ional and solicitorial districts, and preserving for the people the right of initiative and referendum.
