Efficiency To Key Food Costs In '56 A&P Head Declares

There should be plentiful supplies of food for America's record level appetites in 1956 with retail prices continuing about as low as in 1955 Ralph W. Burger, president of the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, said today.

Mr. Burger said that food prices in 1955 were 1.5 per cent lower than in 1954 and 4.8 per cent below the post World War II peak reached in 1952. The over-all cost of living in 1955, he noted, was down only fourtenths of one per cent.

"Present forecasts show that food come close to the record 1955 level and that prices to consumers will remain about the same. With average weather there should be adequate food supplies to meet consumer demand," Mr. Burger said.
