The work was made more difficult because of the scalar and soft-ground, which caused numerous cave-ins. The front walkway was separated from the steps. It was also necessary to dig up the double driveway between the parsonage and the idjacent residence of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Holland in order to connect the new piping to the one beneath the yard of Mr. Holland's. However, this morning, the yard looked much more natural with most of the piping laid. No damage was done to the parsonage, in the Baptist Church.
