Funeral services for Mrs. C. W. Ramsey, 70, of 4 Charles Lane, Oakley, who died at her home Thursday night of last week, were conducted at 2 p. m., Sunday in the chapel of Groce Funeral Home.

Workmen have been busy for the past week, despite heavy and continuous rains, digging out the drums and replacing them with permanent cement-steel-enforced tubing, three feet in diameter. The work was made more difficult because of the soaked and soft ground, which caused numerous cave-ins. The front walkway was separated from the steps. It was also necessary to dig up the double driveway between the parsonage and the adjacent residence of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Holland in order to connect the new piping to the one beneath the yard of Mr. Holland's. However, this morning, the yard looked much more natural with most of the piping laid. No damage was done to the parsonage, much to the delight of the Rev. and Mrs. D. D. Gross and members of the Baptist Church. The project, costing approximately \$1,200, was partly "taken care of" Sunday when members of the church contributed more than \$900 toward the expenses. —Cut Courtesy Asheville Times.
