sent by Baley and he was certain that Baley acted in good faith in presenting the warrants.

"However, the case boils down to this," Judge Warlick said. "Can houses be searched and effects and properties seized before an action has been taken . . . in other words, are these bills of indictment valid if they were brought about by confiscation and impoundment of the election materials prior to proper procedure under Rule 41?"

"It's purely and simply a legal matter—should the action have been taken as it was or on a motion under 41?" Judge Warlick questioned.

T. A. Uzzell Jr., Asheville attorney, with W. R. Francis of Marshall, counsel for the defendants cited the Fourth Amendment as a guard against search and seizure and said the government should have proceeded under a proper motion.

New 3-Cent Postage Stamp Now On Sale

The Post Office Department has issued a 3-cent stamp to commemorate the centennial anniversary of

the birth of Booker T. Washington through the Booker Washington Birthplace, Va., post office.

Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the stamp may send a reasonable number of addressed envelopes to the Postmaster, Booker Washington Birthplace, Va., with money order remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed. Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment. Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either sealed or turned in. An outside envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. The envelope to the Postmaster, Booker Washington Birthplace, Va., should be endorsed "First-Day Covers." Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations since covers will be machine canceled so far as practicable. Orders for first-day covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the 3-cent Booker T. Washington commemorative stamp will be available at the Philatelic Agency, Post Office Department,
