Morty Buckner Prepares Good Bed For His Alfalfa

Morty Buckner of the East Fork community believes in preparing a good seed bed for alfalfa. He says that he's convinced that many of the poor stands of alfalfa are due to poor seed bed preparation.

When he prepared his land for a spring seeding of alfalfa, he plowed the land with a bottom plow, disked the soil twice, and culminated in breaking up the soil which had run together.

After plowing, he applied two tons of lime and 1,000 pounds of 3-12-12 fertilizer with bones and mixed it well with the top three inches of soil.

Then he inoculated the seed with the alfalfa bacteria. Morty says that Buckner's alfalfa stands are the best in the community and it would be hard to see to it that

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Federal Tax Refund On Farms Cited On Gasoline Used

A law has been passed which enables farmers to get the refund of Federal Tax on gasoline used on the farm.

A very simple form is now available for farmers wishing to file for the refund on gasoline used on the farm. This form, "Form 2240," will be available in the county agents office, in the banks, A.S.C. office and at other places in the county. The first refund claim is due before October 1, 1956. This claim will cover all gasoline purchased for farm use since December 31, 1955 until July 1, 1956. A refund will amount to 2c per gallon.

Only four items are asked for in filing for the refund as follows: The farmer's name and address. Gallons of gasoline purchased during the claim period. The amount of refund claim. Instruction for filing the claim are on the back of the form and are very simple.
